W4 - Community Engagement: Building Trust and Impact (WORKSHOP)

This workshop delves into impactful community engagement strategies, drawing on the diverse experiences of Vermonters. Participants will gain skills, commitments, and techniques for creating genuine and accessible engagement initiatives. Through facilitated discussions, we will address key themes, including the importance of lived experiences, the influence of organizational history on practices, the role of identity in building trust, and methods for fostering robust community relationships. Additionally, we will explore how community engagement can and should evolve to become more just, inclusive, and effectively serve all Vermonters.

**W5s - Addressing Digital Equity and Broadband Expansion: A Case Study from the NEK (WORKSHOP)

Northeast Kingdom Community Action (NEKCA) and Northeast Kingdom Broadband (NEK Broadband) have partnered together to bring The Northeast Kingdom Digital Equity Project (NEKDEP) pilot to their region of the state to close the digital divide.
